

SYNOPSIS

ERIN, a high school senior, attempts but fails to come out to her mother, CONNIE. Distraught, she seeks out her safe space, a hideaway in the attic. But she's soon called downstairs to assist her frail grandpa, VINCE, as he moves in. When FRANK, her father, spills the contents of Vince's box, Erin glimpses a peak at her grandfather's decades-old entertainer's vest. Later that evening, MELISSA, Erin's high school crush, works with Erin on their class project. Wanting to make her move, Erin is frustrated when she's unable to muster the courage to make her affection for Melissa known.

Defeated, Erin shows Melissa out and rummages through Vince's boxes, finding the gleaming vest she saw earlier. She dons the antique attire, modeling in front of her mirror. But inside a vest pocket, she discovers a military dog tag belonging to "Elijah Burns." The unexpected find leads to a shocking discovery: intimate photos capture grandpa Vince, as a young man, posing intimately with a black ballet dancer. Could Vince be secretly gay?

Transformed, Erin works up the bravery to come out to Vince. Mortified at first, Vince slowly warms to Erin before admitting his own truth; that he was in love with a male Broadway dancer. Erin is mesmerized. Together, the duo teams up, launching an effort to track down ELIJAH (the dancer), and, dauntingly, come out to their family together.



DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

The opportunity is ripe to tell a bold, progressive narrative that confers the mores of elder wisdom, familial bonds, bravery, and a tinge of magic onto traditionally marginalized characters. Enter *Elijah*: a unique portrait into the joy, frustration, elation, and terror encountered by a Queer Gen Z teenager and her elder LGBTQ grandfather. As LGBTQ communities garner acceptance, queer characters will permeate the social fabric of America cinema: kids, grandpas, moms, and dads will be happily gay, regardless of film genre, scale of production, or intended audience. This is what *Elijah* sets out to do.

The ritual known as "coming out" is similarly overdue for a cinematic makeover. While we often see youthful characters reveal their vulnerability on screen, rarely do we see eighty year-olds do so. *Elijah* is a kids film as much as it is one for senior citizens: our story seeks to destignatize being old and gay, just as we hope to shatter stereotypes surrounding today's queer high school students. *Elijah* connects LGBTQ stories about acceptance and resiliency to the wholly American message of championing family. In doing so, the film places queer characters as the guardians of family values; something the LGBTQ community has always been able to do but which *Elijah* has the unique privilege of portraying.

The road toward acceptance is different for everyone. Only after one accepts their LGBTQ identity, do they realize their unique perch in the universe. A gay person is endowed with many gifts: empathy for the downtrodden, a keen ability to detect bigotry and prejudice, and a profound capacity for compassion. And in 2019, a hopeful narrative fueled by optimism and emblazoned with diversity can be the stamp of difference that American Cinema needs. Given the long march toward LGBTQ equality, it is imperative that a family-driven queer movie shows the power that our community—kids and elders included—now wield.



DIRECTOR'S BIO



Patrick Fritz is a filmmaker, writer, director, and production designer. His most recent work is *Elijah*, a heartwarming, intergenerational coming of age story featuring diverse LGBTQ characters. The short film is slated to screen at United Talent Agency and William Morris Endeavor before it begins its festival circuit thereafter. His other recent director work, a film commissioned by the Spirit of Troy and its band director of 50 years, Dr. Arthur C. Bartner, features interviews from composer Alan Silvestri, producer Kevin Feige, NFL coach Pete Carroll, Matt Barkley, and a litany of musicians, USC athletes, and alums. As a freelance production designer, Patrick has completed ten projects with Disney Digital Network, and 25 total projects including online commercials, music videos, short films, web series, and one indie feature effort. Patrick's USC junior thesis film, *Backwards*, was selected for screening at the iconic LA festival, *Dances With Films*.

A native of Jupiter, Florida, Patrick graduated from Alexander W. Dreyfoos School of the Arts High School, where he focused on music and film studies. He is a 2016 graduate of the School of Cinematic Arts at USC, earning a B.A in Film and Television Production. He also holds a M.S. in Entrepreneurship & Innovation from USC's Marshall School of Business.
