TOKYO DREAMERS, a little violence

SYNOPSIS:

"Tokyo Dreamers, a little violence" depicts a day in the life of three women living in Tokyo. Based on real stories, this film describes how they survive claustrophobia, hostility, sexism and isolation at their work and in their everyday lives. Made collaboratively, the cast and crew members generously committed and gave time to this project because of their desire to tell these stories. This narrative speaks to many young women and men today living "normal" lives whilst providing some insight on contemporary Tokyo.



DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT:


This film was born from a conversation with my friend and acting colleague, Natsuko Hori. We wanted to depict "normal" women in their thirties in Japan, who feel stuck in mundane

jobs, and who are dealing with "microaggressions" on a daily basis. The three main characters are fictionalized interpretations of some of our own experiences, doing various odd jobs to support a career in the arts.

There is a large gap in our generation in many developed countries between the dreams we were encouraged to pursue, and most people's reality of having to do less satisfying jobs to make ends meet.

Another issue I wanted to highlight is the sense of isolation that each of these women face in their work environments - one working at a call center, one at home as a freelancer, and one as a hostess in an upscale club in Ginza.

The conversations in this film are based on actual everyday interactions, and aim to depict with a dark sense of humor some of the repressed anger and violence that people are suddenly faced with for no good reason.



PRODUCTION NOTES:



Director's Biography:

Bryerly Long graduated with a BA Hons in Japanese Literature from the University of Oxford, and joined the contemporary Japanese theatre company Seinendan in 2010. She made her film debut in "Hospitalite" (2010) by Koji Fukada, also a member of Seinendan. Long

co-produced and starred in "Sayonara" (2015) by Fukada, the first film to feature a real android robot. She has worked as an actress with various established Japanese directors in theatre and film. She has also directed stage productions combining various genres (dance, music, theatre and photography) in Tokyo and at Oxford. "Tokyo Dreamers, a little violence" is her debut work as a film director.
