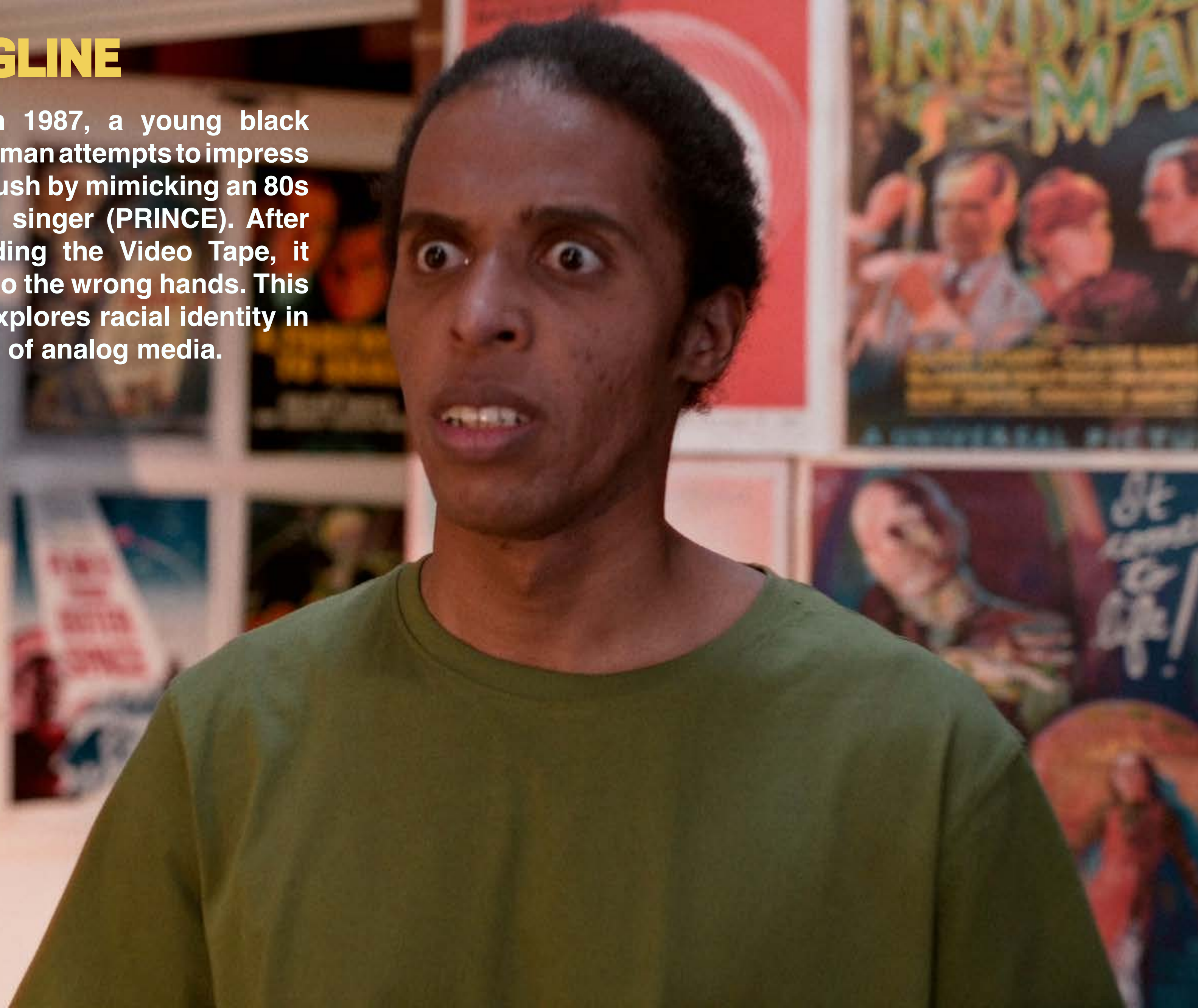

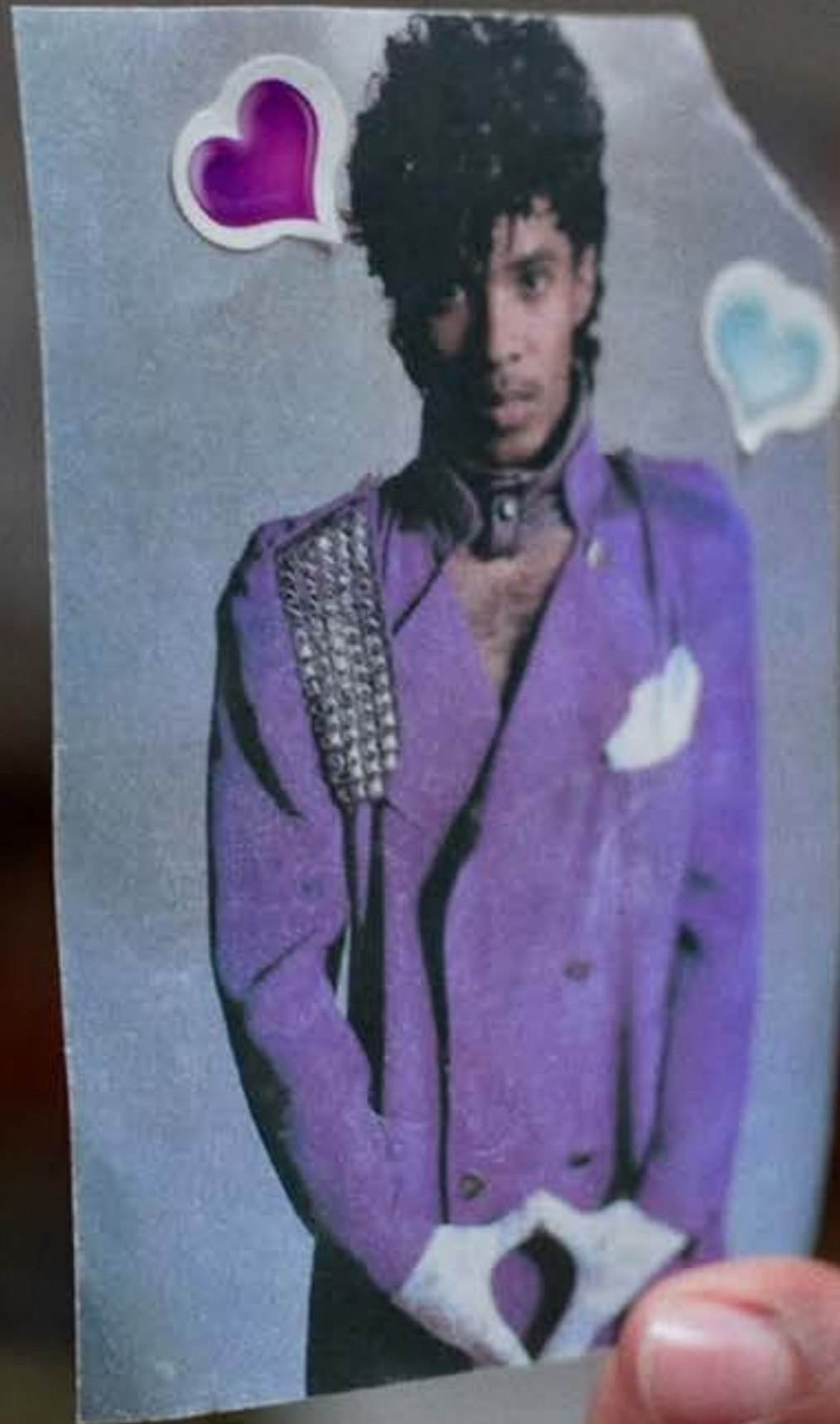

SYNOPSIS

Set in 1987, Eyad, a black young Saudi, waits for his sister in the school parking lot, but is assaulted with a juice can by a bunch of bullies who call him names. Areej, his sister, asks if they can drive her friend Mashael back home. They play her favorite song. He attempts to call her landline later on but she shuts the phone in his face. Later on, his friend advises him to mimic Crown (based on Prince), the black singer who Mashael loves.

When he plays the music video on VHS tape during the family's gathering, the mom is enraged by the dance moves and hides the tape. Areej asks if she can borrow the tape, but he says no. Instead, he mimics Crown, videos it with his friend, then returns the tape to his sister to give to Mashael, in hopes she would be impressed.

However, the video store owner calls the mom to ask her to return the tapes. The mom places all tapes for return, including the one Eyad recorded. Someone rents the video, and Eyad's dance goes viral. He attempts for the last time to impress Mashael by appearing at school with his new style, confronts the bullies and throws a juice box at them, but they beat him up. At home, his sister and mom yell at him after hearing about the video. Eyad is depressed, the phone rings insistently, he answers, a love song plays. Then Mashael speaks, she loves his video. A large smile appears on his face.

COVER LETTER



This film was a collaborative effort between me and my screenwriter/lead actor, Motasem Nasser. In 2019, we sat together talking about our experience of being bullied by racists while growing up in Saudi Arabia, him for being black, and myself for looking Asian. Although I grew up in the 80s and he in the 90s, we connected over those experiences. We didn't want to explore the film in a sad or serious tone, the Arab world is filled with sad and depressing films. Coating it in a comedic, absurdist style was intentional. We wanted the audience to relate through laughter, and give them a light hearted sweet film in the tradition of romantic comedies. This film is also a homage for Prince, an iconic

black figure of the 80s, whose feminine style is very relevant today, and portrayed by Saudi Gay model Saad Almowalid, whose research on Saudi black history informed the writing this film. The selection of traditional Saudi songs which sang about "dark skin" were also informed by his research. The Arab world still lags behind when it comes to issues of race, and black pride is still hidden behind songs that glorify and refer to blackness as "dark skin". This film captures the zeitgeist of that period as lived, in hopes that the new generations would identify with the protagonists from decades ago.
