



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With their dying mother on life support, siblings Jessica and Robbie find themselves at odds over the difficult decision of whether to let her go. They gather their large family together at their aunt Carmen's home in hopes of settling the disagreement.

Amidst the emotionally charged potluck, they hold a tense family vote. Despite Robbie's protests, the family unites in Victoria's hospital room for a collective prayer before taking her off life support. As Victoria takes her last breaths, Jessica and Robbie find solace in one another, sharing an intense moment of grief.

Directors Statement

Grief exists in many different forms. There is no one "right" way to do it. Whether it be losing someone you love or making the difficult decision of letting them go, grief is a universal feeling. **THE VOTE** is a personal story based on my own lived experiences with my father being on life support. At age 11, I was put in a serious family meeting with all of my uncles and aunties to come to a decision to end my father's life support. It was an incredibly painful and emotional conversation that brought tears and disagreements. Through the narratives of the main characters, Jessica and Robbie, in this story, I wanted to portray how differences with family members can tear us apart and how we can also connect through our collective grief.

With **THE VOTE**, I hope to highlight the difficulty of making these life-changing decisions, especially one for your own parents. While these are often portrayed as financial or logistical problems to be resolved, they are so much more nuanced than that. While burial and estate plans help families come to decisions during these difficult times, the weight of making these decisions on our own is not an easy one to carry. Unfortunately, the price of care in the US also affects these decisions and puts underprivileged communities at a higher disadvantage. These decisions, then, no longer feel like choices, but almost like an order to move on.

As a Chicana/Korean-American director, I wanted to explore the concept of grief through the lens of my own roots and upbringing, along with all of its messiness and family drama. I hoped to deliver a powerful story that resonates with audiences, as well as to encourage reflection on the healing power of love, empathy, and understanding.



Writer/Director Bio

Sylvia Ray is an award-winning Chicana/Korean-American director who focuses on telling stories about characters who overcome feelings of unworthiness. She was born and raised in Barstow, CA, and found her love for storytelling through her parents who watched bootleg Korean dramas and Star Trek while in separate rooms.

Her work pops with a feminine energy with underlying themes of empowerment, morality, and grief. Her film "PREGGERS" won Best Comedy Short at the Arizona International Film Festival and screened at The Academy through the LatinX InFocus program at New Filmmakers LA, among other festivals throughout the US. She was selected for HBO's Tomorrow's Filmmaker's Today program and, as a result, her film "LEN(N)Y" was streamed to audiences on Pantaya and DISH! Latino worldwide.

She's worked with critically acclaimed actors like Julio Macias from Netflix's On My Block and Victoria Moroles from Hulu's Plan B on her latest film "THE MIDDLE". A Satellite Collective Fellow, Sylvia is based in Los Angeles and pulls inspiration from her desert-town upbringing, travels abroad, and motherhood. As someone who has found comfort and pride in her mixed roots, she is motivated to forge a path that her ancestors only dreamed of while making a positive impact in representation in front of and behind the camera.

Andrea Porras Madero

A native of Torreón, Coah, México, is an accomplished filmmaker based in Los Angeles with a passion for fostering collaboration between artists across Latin America and the United States. Graduating as a Cohen Scholar from the USC School of Cinematic Arts' BFA Film & Television Production program, Andrea's impact extended beyond academics — she founded Acción Latine, the pioneering Latine student organization at the School of Cinematic Arts.

Her journey continued as she produced two more short films, a pilot, and a feature film entirely shot in Mexico. Currently, Andrea is immersed in post-production for a captivating documentary exploring the world of mezcal and the inspiring individuals shaping its narrative.

Annie Huang is a first-generation Asian American who grew up in Vietnam, Taiwan, and Hong Kong before immigrating to the States at age 11, where she started learning English as her 4th language with the help of American subtitled films. She has over 7 years of experience working in creative development, film production, and marketing strategy at Warner Bros. Studios, Universal Pictures, Searchlight Pictures, CBS Studios, and Sony Pictures. Annie is a producer on a slate of indie projects with creatives from across the globe, with the goal of leveraging her studio knowledge and relationships to help rising filmmakers break into the studio realm.

Composer


Juan Carlos Enriquez

In addition, Juan Carlos has contributed music to Golden Globe and BAFTA nominated projects and scores such as Narcos (Netflix), Maya and the Three (Netflix), and Far Cry 6 (Ubisoft). In 2022 he scored NBCUniversal's first Spanish-speaking streaming show on Peacock, 'Til Jail Do Us Part (Armas de Mujer on HBO Max Latin America), starring Kate del Castillo (The Book of Life) as well as the Netflix thriller series The Secret of the Greco Family, starring Manuel Masalva (Narcos: Mexico).


















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
