LONG SYNOPSIS

Set in the festive summer of 2018 between the blue tides and the raining sun. Noah finds himself on a secluded beach with his friend Mia and a group of boys. With no place to stay, no car, and only their belongings and a few cans of beer. Mia, chooses to leave Noah behind, drifting away with a new boyfriend.

Out of necessity, Noah falls into the rhythm of the group, tagging along with Nick and the others. They spend the afternoon playing drinking games, with Noah initially feeling out of place. But as the hours slip by and the beers flow, Noah begins to relax, his guard lowering as he's slowly accepted into the fold.

The story takes a turn, when Nick reveals his attraction to Noah. Tension escalates when Nick's stepmother, Lisa, begins to grow suspicious of them. Uncomfortable with Noah's presence, she eventually forces him out of her home. The boys watch in silence, no one stepping forward to defend him.

Alone, with nowhere to go, Noah wanders the streets in a haze of shame. His sense of belonging shattered. He crosses paths with Jo, a local resident. Their first interaction is hostile, a mix-up that ends with Jo accidentally hitting Noah with a book, mistaking him for a magple. Realising her mistake, Jo immediately takes responsibility and offers help, inviting Noah into her home for a meal.

Though Noah is quiet, Jo senses his isolation without needing words. She offers him a place to stay, and in the coming day, she takes him along on her daily fishing trips. As they spend more time together, they open up to each other—sharing stories, vulnerabilities, and truths. In Jo, Noah finds someone who understands him, someone who sees him for who he truly is.

Later that afternoon, Noah decides to reconnect with his friends, realising that he's ready to move on. But he finds himself back at Jo's house by evening, and they share a light moment, passing a joint and laughing together. Their connection is brief yet profound—a sweet, ephemeral bond that was simply just enough.



Kevin Khan stars as the lead role 'Noah' in January, Noah has always yearned and longed for a sense of belonging without knowing how to articulate it. He's always just managed to 'fit in' without taking too much space to be noticeable. Subservient, kind-hearted and sometimes anxious - gets taken for granted by his peers. A product of his environment, Noah is stuck in fair weather friendships derived from a private school education reeking of toxic masculinity and a prevailing euro-centric culture - his heart is desperately trying to climb out - he just needs someone to throw him a rope.

Kevin Khan is an Australian-Vietnamese actor based in Naarm/Melbourne. Graduating from The National Theatre Drama School in 2020. During his time he worked across an array of in-house productions across both theatre and film. Shortly after, he received representation from Active Artist's and went on to play the recurring role of 'Anh' in Paramount Plus' Last King Of The Cross - working alongside Tim Roth Reservoir Dogs' (1992), Hoa Xuande 'The Sympathiser' (2024), Lincoln Younes and many more. Currently Kevin is developing his own screenplay 'Tommy' in background of working on a supporting role for an upcoming Screen Australia / Amazon Prime feature film 'Sacrifice', where he plays a young soldier Mason Mullet Le'. Beyond Kevin's innate passion for acting, he works freelance as a DJ playing at events and venues across Melbourne.





Amanda Ma stars as 'Jo' in January, embodying a woman in her fullness. She is as fierce as she is nurturing, as grounded as she is sporadic, serious as she is witty. Unapologetic and deeply maternal; Jo's life is simply blissful to the naked eye, but that's not to say she hasn't suffered. After a life of loss and losing a child she has been on a healing journey ever since. Jo is the living example of the embodied bohemian spirit.

Graduating from the Victorian College of the Arts in 1975, an esteemed alumni of St. Martins Theatre School and the Kathleen Gorham Ballet Academy. Amanda paved the path for young Asian actors in Australia. Amanda has left an indelible mark on the industry through her extensive work across film, television, and theatre. Her diverse career includes notable performances on stage including Anthem (Melb. Syd. Perth festivals), Cybec Electric (MTC), A Ghost in Her Suitcase (Melb. Syd. Perth festivals). And on screen in both mainstream and art house productions including Stateless (Netflix), Family Law (SBS), Better Man (SBS), Bed of Roses (ABC), Highway to hell (1991), The Furnace (2020) and Strange Creatures (2024).

Amanda's artistic journey took her to New York, where she created and presented her own performances, leading to a short film that garnered awards and was featured at the Melbourne Film Festival and other U.S. venues. In addition to her film and theatre work, Amanda contributes her passion for storytelling and the arts as a freelance Safari Tour Guide at the Werribee Open Range Zoo where she expresses her endless love for animals.





Charlie Di Stefano stars as 'Nick' in January, Nick is the charismatic embodiment of white privilege. He exudes a golden exterior of confidence, charm and innocence yet beneath the facade lies a love starved boy in a hollow home. Concealing his homosexuality and harbouring a world of secrets few are privy to, Nick could end up just like his father.

Charlie Di Stefano, based in Melbourne, Australia, is a versatile artist known for his extensive work in acting. He began his career at a young age, appearing in numerous short films across Australia and the United States. His long-running role in the iconic Australian series Neighbours gained him significant recognition. More recently, Charlie has featured in the popular TV show Last Kings of the Cross (Season 2) and the ABC series Crazy Fun Park. In addition to television, Charlie has made a lasting impression in theatre, playing iconic roles such as John Proctor in The Crucible and King Malcolm in Macbeth. Although primarily known for his acting, Charlie is also recognised for his filmmaking. His most notable project, Is This Forever, is an emotionally driven film that has won over 40 awards worldwide. Drawing from his personal experiences with grief. Before this, Charlie also spent some time living in Los Angeles, where he further expanded his creative network. With a diverse acting background and a growing presence as a filmmaker, he continues to explore challenging subjects both in front of and behind the camera, bringing authenticity and depth to all his projects.



Xin, a Chinese Australian actor, writer and director based in Naarm (Melbourne), Australia. With an early break into the industry - featuring a notable role as a series regular in ABC's The Heights' (2019), followed by a guest appearance in The Furnace.' (2020). Currently represented by CBM - one of Australia's top talent agents, Xin has dedicated the past seven years to refining his skills whilst simultaneously working freelance. With roots in both stage and screen, Xin integrates both naturalism and dramatics into his poetic storytelling giving his characters and performances a layered existence. Xin has a distinct approach to explore psychosocial behaviours and the neural development of his characters to always portray 'real' believable people on screen. His research and community participation extends across dance, connection, spiritual and embodiment workshops worldwide.

In recent years, Xin has delved into directing, working and collaborating closely with esteemed mentors, including Kim Farrant 'Strangerland' (2015) - starring Nicole Kidman and Hugo Weaving, and Anthony Brandon Wong 'The Matrix' (2003) - starring Keanu Reeves and Laurence Fishburne, Co-existing with his passion for acting, Xin nurtures a profound ambition to tell untold stories and bring unseen characters to screens. Drawing from both lived experience and fascination, his stories break from conventions and expectations of who people 'are' and who they 'should be'. Xin with a passion for humanity desires to explore the profound depths of storytelling and create beautiful, compelling, truthful work.

DIRECTORS STATEMENT

Honouring my teenage self, I gathered recollections, memories, exchanges, events, conversations, looks, words said and unsaid during my upbringing in conservative Western Australia. I used them to paint a picture of friendship against blue currents, white sands, and purple skies. 'JANUARY' shares my personal lived experience of being a second-generation immigrant growing up with working-class parents amongst an opulent and Eurocentric culture where isolation and invisibility came with being anything but Caucasian.

I specifically wanted to pry into the dynamics of modern day Australian coastal towns, where people are often barefoot and carefree. Where breathtaking bucolic beauty conceals an undercurrent of exclusion and hostility. It was about conjuring these energies and turning them into the characters. I created these characters based on people who were real and that I knew in my own life but were noticeably absent from the big screens. Noah (Kevin Khan) and Jo (Amanda Ma) embody the characters I longed to see on screen growing up, even up until now. In the film, Jo is everything that an Asian woman is and more. And Noah is just a boy who wanted to belong somewhere. Their story bridges the worlds—youth and maturity, Asian and Australian. Emphasising the co-existence of these narratives within the diasporic experience.

To me, an actor's role is to create a 'full' human being—one, audiences can see themselves in. As a director, I had the privilege of witnessing and fostering a safe container for this exploration. We worked with our fears, truths, vulnerabilities and boundaries throughout this process. We welcomed all parts of ourselves – the good, bad and the ugly, and we weaved it into the fabric of the film.

This project also grew from just wanting to gather all my friends together and create something precious and special. I have been so lucky to develop this vision alongside a talented, strong, supportive, diverse, and loving group of filmmakers. Together crafting a narrative that celebrates identity and culture through a lived experiences that speaks to many. This film also represents a homage and an endless love I have for my parents, family, chosen family, elders and other mentors in my life. Often, I am very susceptible to volatility in this rapidly growing world. I feel I am always in and out touch, conflicted and resolved, grounded and ungrounded, found and then lost. But it is these nourishing connections that have kept me going. I do believe it is paramount for young people to have guidance and have someone to throw them a rope. Especially in this day and especially as artists, I hope JANUARY can be a reminder for that.


