

LAURA SANTORO Laura Santoro, originally from San Dimas, CA, is a TV writer whose dark comedies take aim at social taboos, messy families, and the absurdities that come with both. Raised on a thoroughbred horse farm in Southern California, she learned early on that nothing has more drama than a racetrack—except the people who raised her. The daughter of a Mexican mother and an Italian-American father, her biracial background drives her storytelling, focusing on identity, disability, and the Latine experience. Laura has written two episodes of television for Netflix's Gabby's Dollhouse and has worked as a Writers' Assistant or Script Coordinator on Bad Robot's Duster (HBO Max), Lopez vs Lopez (NBC), Shining Vale (Starz), Best Foot Forward (Apple TV+), and Turner & Hooch (Disney+).
